SUPREME CHAPLAIN'S MONTHLY CHALLENGE

Each month, Archbishop William Lori – Supreme Chaplain of the Knights of Columbus – selects a brief passage from the Gospel reading of one of the Sunday Masses of the month.

Archbishop Lori shares a brief reflection on the passage and issues a challenge for men to live by for the month.

The next month, men undertaking the challenge as a group gather and share their experiences living the challenge.

STATE ADVOCATE JAMES KORTH

James is a former President of the 11th Judicial District and Keith County Bar Associations, a former member of



the Nebraska Bar Association House of Delegates, and a graduate of the Nebraska Bar Association's Leadership Academy. He is licensed in both the State of Nebraska and the State of Colorado.

James is married to Kami (m. 2015). They are the parents of Joslyn (b. 2016), James (b. 2018), and Jackson (b. 2020). They attend St. Luke's Catholic Church in Ogallala and James is a member of the St. Luke's Council. James became a Knight of Columbus on July 30, 2015, advanced to the Third Degree on October 29, 2017, and became State Advocate in July of 2019.

Importance of Filing a Form 990

Each year, a tax-exempt organization must file an information return or notice with the Internal Revenue Service (IRS), unless an exception applies. Form 990 is the primary tool with which the IRS gathers information about tax-exempt organizations. Any organization that fails to file the required information return (Form 990, Form 990-EZ, or Form 990-PF) or e-Postcard (Form 990-N) for three consecutive tax years will automatically lose its tax-exempt status. Form 990 is due on the 15th day of the 5th month following the end of the organization's taxable year. For organizations on a calendar year, Form 990 is due on May 15th of the following year.

This website, maintained by the IRS, presents Form 990 in PDF format, as well as provides instructions for completing Form 990. If you encounter any difficulty in preparing Form 990, it is recommended that you consult a certified public accountant or attorney for assistance.

Liability Insurance for Council Activities

Before hosting any event open to the general public, it is imperative councils procure liability insurance with adequate coverage limits. It is equally critical that councils add the Nebraska State Council as an additional insured, as well as any other entity directly involved with the event in question *e.g.*, church, school, etc.

Home or Holding Company

A home or holding company is a company that doesn't conduct any operations, ventures, or other active tasks for itself. Rather, it exists for the purpose of owning assets, such as real estate, and can act as a liability shield protecting such assets from adverse litigation against a related operating entity. As such, any council that owns real estate, such as a building, and wishes to protect that asset from adverse litigation should consider forming a home or holding corporation. A home or holding company may take the form of a corporation, limited liability company, or other qualified entity. Creating a legal entity such as a home or holding company is a complex process with multiple important considerations. Seeking the assistance of an attorney and certified public accountant is recommended.

Resolutions

Each year, the State Advocate issues a letter to all subordinate councils providing a deadline within which all proposed resolutions for that Columbian year must be submitted for consideration at the State Convention. After that deadline has passed, the State Advocate provides all subordinate councils with a list of the resolutions to be considered at the State Convention that Columbian year. At the time of the State Convention, the State Advocate presides over a Resolutions Committee, which reviews all proposed resolutions and determines which resolutions will be recommended for approval by the membership body during the business meeting at the State Convention.

STATE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY RAY GUGGENBERGER

Starting his 25th year as the Executive Secretary of the Nebraska State Council, Ray is responsible for assisting the State Deputy and State Secretary in the routine, day-to-day correspondence and reports that include per capita assessments and all state meeting coordination and preparation. He lives in Bellevue.

Ray has served in various leadership positions in Columban Council 6192, including Grand Knight and First-Degree Team member. On the state level, he has served as Administrative Assistant, Retention Chairman, Community Chairman, Reports Chairman, and District Deputy. Ray is a retired Air Force First Sergeant, having served for 23 years. He has been a member of the Knights of Columbus for 36 years.

HELPFUL HINTS FROM RAY

**REPORT OF OFFICERS FORM 185: You must have a Grand Knight, Deputy Grand Knight, Treasurer, Chancellor and 3 Trustees. If filing this report online with the FS Member Management system, pay careful attention to the top of the report indicating which fraternal year you are reporting on. This report is also how you make a change from previously reported information.

REPORT OF SERVICE PERSONNEL FORM 365: Provide as much information as you have, the report does not need a name in every position. There are five **required positions, Program Director, Family Director, Community Director, Membership Director, and Retention Chairman. If filing this report online with the FS Member Management system, pay careful attention to the top of the report indicating which fraternal year you are reporting on. This is also how you make a change from previously reported information.

**Completion of these two forms will place your officers and directors on Supreme's mailing list to receive the Knightline and other informative items.

SEMI-ANNUAL REPORT OF AUDIT FORM 1295: This report ensures that your council's FS retains the bond provided by Supreme at no cost to your council. REMEMBER, THE "AS OF DATE" IS NOT THE DATE YOU ARE PREPARING THIS REPORT. Pay special attention to the line where you record the number of delinquent members. The State and Supreme Councils use this information in the processing of any suspension requests from your council.

PRAYER REQUEST GUIDELINES: The State Council has developed database of email addresses for our Councils, Assemblies, etc. We are happy to forward any requests for prayers for our extended Nebraska State Family. We do need to keep the request simple and to the point. As an example:

"Request prayers for Brother X's wife who is having heart surgery. Brother X is from Council XXXX in Omaha."

Requests for these prayers should be forwarded to Executive Secretary, Ray Guggenberger at rguggenberger@cox.net. No other types of solicitations, such as fundraisers, will be forwarded through this email list. We request that each Council, Assembly, etc. forward these requests on to their members. 



HOW TO FILL OUT THE REPORTS

You will notice on the Supreme website that there are two types of formats for each form printed in blue, PDF and Online. To use the Online version, you need to have Supreme's Member Management Program. Anyone can use the PDF version. To start, click on the blue PDF. When the form opens, you can fill in any field that is shaded in light blue. Once you have it completed, you can save it to your computer. On the upper right-hand side of the form there are two icons you can use to save the completed form. You can then attach the form to an e-mail and e-mail it to the people listed on the bottom of the form. You could also print the form and mail it, but Supreme, the State Deputy and Executive Secretary Ray Guggenberger would rather you e-mail it. You can print it more than once. Be sure to save a copy for yourself.

SAFE ENVIRONMENT PROGRAM TRAINING AND BACKGROUND CHECK REQUIREMENTS


When you fill out your Form 365, Service Program Personnel Report, be sure to include the Grand Knight, Program Director, Family Director, and Community Director positions, with their e-mail address. Those positions are required to take the Safe Environment Training if they have not done so within the last three years. Submitting the Form 365 will trigger an e-mail to be sent to each one of those positions that will contain a login and password for a website to take the Safe Environment Training. The login and password are only active for thirty days, so Knights need to get it done promptly. If the login and password expire, you will need to submit a new Form 365.

The e-mail you receive will come from Armatus Administrator and will look similar the one below. Praesidium's Armatus is the company Supreme contracted with to administer the Safe Environment Program. The e-mail will contain the link to the training website. There will also be a personalized login, id and password. Again, this login id is only valid for thirty days, so please watch for the e-mail and get the training completed.

Dear Brother Knight

As a fraternal leader in the Knights of Columbus, it is one of your duties to protect the youth that we serve. The Order's commitment to protect youth is of the highest priority and to further that commitment, the Board of Directors has designated you to fulfill the requirements of the Order's Safe Environment Program. These requirements include online training relating to abuse awareness, mandatory reporting, and the program's policies and procedures. The Order enhanced its Safe Environment Program by partnering with Praesidium, Inc. and uses Praesidium's Armatus online platform to deliver the required training modules. Your completion of these online training modules demonstrates your commitment to protecting young people.

Praesidium's Armatus online training platform may be accessed from your desktop computer, laptop computer, or iPad that is connected to the Internet. As a Board-designated fraternal leader, you are required to complete three training modules: (1) Meet Sam, (2) Duty to Report, and (3) Know Your Policies. Each module can be completed at your own pace, however; the training must be completed within 30 days from receipt of this notification.



Our goal is to strengthen our men and their families in the faith.

Building the Domestic Church Kiosk

By making the Building the Domestic Church Kiosk (#BDC-K) available in your parish and organizing activities based on its content, councils will educate and evangelize using the rich, faith-based literature found in the Catholic Information Service (CIS) Building the Domestic Church series of booklets. Since 1948, CIS has been the major evangelical arm of the Knights of Columbus. Through multiple booklet series and various media formats, CIS makes our Catholic faith accessible and continually provides tools for catechesis and faith formation. For \$150, councils will receive a Building the Domestic Church Kiosk (#BDC-K) and the first set of 225 booklets of the most popular CIS resources, aimed at helping Catholics to live out the Church's vision for our families. Holy Hour--Featured Program

Encourage deep personal encounter with God. Eucharistic adoration in the form of a regularly scheduled Holy Hour is a simple, direct, and meaningful way to address these needs. It is familiar to many, easy to organize, and something everyone can participate in together regardless of age, vocation, stage of life, or membership status. A Knights of Columbus Holy Hour, prepared for the men of the parish, could include a reflection, communal rosary, prayers for intercession by Blessed Michael McGivney or St. Joseph, and various other aspects as decided by the council. Into The Breach--Featured Program

In his apostolic exhortation, Into the Breach, Bishop Thomas J. Olmsted outlines the challenges faced by men of faith in the world today. Using either Bishop Olmsted's inspirational letter or the Knights of Columbus video series it inspired, councils will prayerfully examine the crisis of religious faith in our world. By discussing the lessons and calls to action found throughout Into the Breach, men will begin to devise a personal plan of spiritual battle to strengthen their lives, their families, and their communities. Blessed Michael McGivney Prayer Hour

Celebrate the beatification of Blessed Michael McGivney through a special prayer hour open to the whole parish. Built around the Luminous Mysteries of the Rosary, the prayer hour features writings from recent popes and reflections on the life of Blessed Michael McGivney. The prayer hour is a way to invoke the intercession of the blessed Founder of the Knights of Columbus and to be inspired by his life and legacy. Rosary Program

The Knights of Columbus Rosary Program encourages councils to promote devotion to the rosary in our families and parishes by scheduling regular rosary prayer services on any day of the week, at any time of the year, with the guidance of their pastor. Councils should personally invite each family of the parish and offer attending families a copy of the Knights of Columbus Catholic Information Service's A Scriptural Rosary for the Family (#319). Encourage families to read this booklet and learn how their faith can be strengthened through a devotion to Our Lady, while praying the rosary at home together regularly. Kits with rosary rings, rosary prayer guides, and leader books are available for councils to order. For Rosary program resources, visit www.kofc.org/rosary.

Refund Support Vocations Program (RSVP)--Featured Program

As the strong right arm of the church, Knights of Columbus are committed to providing moral, financial, and spiritual support to our future priests and religious at all stages of their formation. Through this program, council and parish families will raise funds to support seminarians in their area. For every \$500 given to an individual, the Supreme Council will refund the council or assembly \$100. The maximum refund a council or assembly can receive is \$400 per individual supported. Councils are also called to provide their "adopted" seminarian or religious aspirant with moral support and prayers for their success. For RSVP resources, visit Refund Support Vocations

Sacramental Gifts

The sacraments stand as the most significant events in the life of the domestic church. The Knights of Columbus will be there to support and embrace our parish families at these essential moments of encounter with Christ. As children and adult members become more integrated into the life of the church and their parish, they should know that members of the Knights of Columbus will always be present in a tangible and meaningful way. Spiritual Reflection – Featured Program

Create annual opportunities for prayer and reflection together as a fraternity. Under the guidance of their chaplain, councils can attend a retreat or day of reflection together or organize their own event for the men of their parish. In conjunction with pastors, councils and jurisdictions can hold low-cost retreats of their own. These events might be open only to council members or men of the parish – or may be open to entire families. Consecration to the Holy Family

To help families live out the joy of Christ, Supreme Chaplain Archbishop William Lori has composed a prayer through which families will come together to consecrate themselves under the protection of the Holy Family. In this prayer, we ask for the aid or intercession of the perfect son Jesus Christ, Mary the perfect mother, and Joseph who is a model for every father. Councils will guide their parishes and community to understand and offer this important and impactful prayer. Preparing for the Consecration to the Holy Family is not a single event. It is choosing a way of life for your family. Through this consecration, each participant is consciously choosing to be a beacon of God's love through His Church. Family Fully Alive--Featured Program

During his visit to the Philippines, Pope Francis cited the need for "holy and loving families to protect the beauty and truth of the family in God's plan and to be an example for other families." The Family Fully Alive monthly devotions are concrete ways that Knights of Columbus, in solidarity with Pope Francis, can support the growth of holy and loving families in the Church. The Family Fully Alive Program asks families to invite God into their homes and cultivates each family as a miniature domestic church. To this end, the program provides monthly themes, scripture verses and activities. Through prayer and reflection, each family has an opportunity to grow in holiness together. Family of the Month/Year--Featured Program

Each month, the council Family of the Month committee selects one parish family who models Christian family values and visibly lives them every day. Once a year, each participating council also selects one of the previous twelve Family of the Month winners to represent the council/parish as the potential international Family of the Year. The Knights of Columbus Family of the Year is chosen by the Supreme Council and recognized each year at the annual Supreme Convention. Family Prayer Night--Featured Program

Catholics often struggle with the reality that they do not have the opportunity to socialize and/or pray with other faith-filled Catholic families. It can be quite a challenge to raise our children in the faith when their only exposure comes from Mom and Dad. Put plainly, the majority of our time can easily be spent in secular circles unless we intentionally create ways to live out the domestic church. Family Prayer Night is an opportunity for children to be exposed to regular people living their faith in a casual setting. Families of council members, as well as other Catholic families within the parish and community, will gather for prayer, dinner, and fellowship. Family Week

Knights of Columbus councils will dedicate a special week of the year to recognize the vital importance of families as the foundation of our domestic church and to promote Catholic family values. When choosing a week, councils should consider factors that might affect parishioner schedules such as school vacations, holidays, and other local events. Though traditionally celebrated in the summer to commemorate the birth and death of our founder, Blessed Michael McGivney, this program can take place anytime during the year. Food For Families--Featured Program

Knights of Columbus are committed to helping end hunger through the Food for Families Program which has donated millions of dollars and millions of pounds of food toward this end. Council and parish families will raise funds to support their local food pantries, food banks, and soup kitchens. For every \$500 or 1,000 pounds of food donated, the Supreme Council will refund \$100 back to the council – up to a maximum of \$500 per council per fraternal year. Though in-kind donation of food is valuable, leaders of hunger-relief organizations often comment that financial contributions can be stretched even further and allow nonprofits to procure the exact items needed by the organization and its clients. Good Friday Family Promotion

Despite Good Friday's central role in the heart of Christianity, attendance at services remains low. To change this, councils will encourage participation in Good Friday services through a promotional campaign. Setting an example for their community, Knights will attend Good Friday services with their families and work with their pastors to encourage increased parishioner involvement at these liturgies. In conjunction with these efforts, councils will also work to educate their parishes about the plight of Christians in the Holy Land. Or, if the council raises 100% of the cost of a vehicle outfitted to serve as a mobile medical unit for a pregnancy center, the Supreme Council will provide 100% of the funds for an ultrasound machine to be used in that vehicle. This initiative is funded by Knights of Columbus state and local councils with matching grants from the Supreme Council's Culture of Life Fund. Consecration to the Holy Family – This should be done in every parish with a Knights of Columbus presence and is celebrated on the First Sunday after Christmas (most years the Feast of the Holy Family).

- Transportation to Mass for people in need of a ride.
- "Keep Christ in Christmas" campaign by selling Christmas cards.
- "Keep Christ in Christmas" advertising campaign on radio, TV, newspaper, a billboard.
- Promote a Mission Sunday.
- Promote an inspirational speaker.
- Promote Eucharistic processions.
- Promote special services, i.e., Benediction, Silver Rose, Marian Hour or Festival, Outdoor Mass.
- Lead Rosary before Mass in May or October.
- Sponsor 40 hours of prayer.
- Have a presence at Stewardship Sunday.
- Special Lenten and Advent liturgies.
- Promote vocations.
- Sponsor a candidate for RCIA.
- Set the Eucharistic Mysteries of the World (replica of display in the Vatican) for parish.
- Teach CCD or religious education.

Overview of the Refund Support Vocations Program (RSVP)

The Knights of Columbus stand in solidarity with our priests and religious. Through this program, council and parish families will raise funds to support seminarians in their area. Though financial support is vitally important, it is not the only aspect of RSVP. Councils are also called to provide their "adopted" seminarian or religious aspirant with moral support and prayers for their success.

Featured Program Requirements

Councils are required to provide financial support of at least \$500 for a minimum of one seminarian. For every \$500 given to an individual, Supreme will refund the council or assembly \$100. The maximum refund a council or assembly can receive is \$400 per individual supported.

VOCATIONS ACTIVITIES

St John Paul II often said: "There is no Church without the Eucharist and there is no Eucharist without the Priest."

The slogan "Vocations are Everybody's Business" has been a long-lasting motto of the Knights of Columbus and rightfully so, as the importance of our priests to the Catholic Church is essential to the Church's continuance and growth.

Founded by a parish priest, the Knights of Columbus has always been a strong defender of the priesthood and religious life and a generous supporter of seminarians and religious in formation. As the largest Catholic fraternal organization in the world, the Order seeks to assist the Church with financial and moral assistance for this purpose.

Considering the needs of the Church in our day, the Order has intensified its promotional programs in recent years. As Knights get more involved in vocations efforts, they find new meaning in their own vocations as Catholic laymen and members of the Order. They also learn more about the importance of teamwork, for the best programs are those planned and carried out by a team.

The vocations chairman is a leader. His job is to call others together, inspire them to share prayers, ideas, and plans, and then reach out beyond the group. The model is Jesus's work with the Apostles. Successful groups need not be large, but they must be committed. Just as priestly and religious vocations are vocations within the Church and at the service of the Church, so the Knights of Columbus vocations program operates within the Church and at her service. Locally, programs should be integrated as much as possible with existing parish and diocesan efforts. For instance, in an ideal situation a Knights of Columbus council will take an active part, or even play a leadership role, in a parish or diocesan vocations program.

Structure and Meetings:

The chairman of either a state or local vocations committee should convene committee meetings at least four times a year. The chaplain should be present if possible. Meetings should follow a standard Knights of

Columbus committee meeting format. While dates and times are up to the chairman and his committee members, it is important to schedule meetings so that work can begin early in the fraternal year. Topics for meetings include at least the following:

State Meetings

- Prepare and complete implementation of the Refund Support Vocations Program (RSVP).
- Possible financial aid to seminarians within the state's jurisdiction.
- Possible aid to overseas seminarians or seminaries.
- Organized prayer to promote vocations.
- The annual observance of Vocations Awareness Week.
- Promoting Knights of Columbus vocational efforts through the media.
- Establishing and maintaining a good working relationship with local bishops.
- Participating financially and prayerfully in seminarian and clergy activities.

Local Meetings

- Prepare and complete implementation of RSVP.
- Vocation awareness days at Catholic elementary, secondary schools or colleges.
- Sponsorship of poster or essay contests in Catholic elementary and secondary schools.
- Organized prayer to promote vocations, especially Holy Hours; Example a half hour prayer service on Sunday afternoon.
- Effective distribution of Knights of Columbus and Catholic Information Service vocations materials in parishes, Catholic schools, and retreat houses.
- Promoting Knights of Columbus vocations efforts through local media.
- Effective publicity to encourage attendance at vocations events.
- Establishing and maintaining a good working relationship with the local pastor and other priests. In the
 case of both state and local meetings, keeping accurate minutes will be of great help to future chairmen
 and committee members.
- Display a picture and bio on a poster or wall in the foyer of church of the seminarians of the diocese. Have extra cards available for parishioners to take home.
- If your parish has a Catholic school, develop 8 x 10 photos of the seminarians in your diocese and have them displayed in the classroom. Encourage the students to communicate with an assigned seminarian.
- Purchase a crucifix and include the vocations prayer card and assign students to take it home for a week or a few days to pray for vocations.
- Have an outdoor banner made to remind the parishioners of special days in the year such as World Day of Prayer for Priests, World Day of Prayer for Vocations, etc.

- Openly express your love for our priests and religious. Use car magnets or stickers; be quick to thank them for their service to us and to God.
- When you observe a young man or woman committed to faith and religion in your parish or community, say to him or her: Have you ever thought about being a priest or sister? or You will be a wonderful priest or sister someday. Do you know that many priests and sisters today say that it was someone who planted the seed of encouragement that sparked the fire that eventually led to their calling to the religious life?

Support for Diocesan Vocations Offices and Programs

Every diocese has a vocations office to promote vocations awareness and recruit candidates for the priesthood and religious life. Bishops appreciate monetary and other assistance to these offices. At the national level, the Supreme Council has contributed to the secretariat for vocations and priestly formation of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops to help support the U.S. bishops' national vocations promotion program. State and local vocations chairmen are encouraged to meet with directors of vocations offices in their dioceses to see how they can help.

Vocations Ads: The Order's magazine *Columbia*, each month carries an advertisement on its back cover promoting priestly and religious vocations. Reading about a man or woman who has responded to the Lord's call can inspire someone else to do the same. The ads also help spread vocations awareness among Knights of Columbus members and others. State or local councils and assemblies are welcome to copy *Columbia* ads for nonprofit use in parish bulletins and flyers.

Vocations Materials: The Knights of Columbus offers vocations posters suitable for use in schools, churches, retreat houses, and other places. One poster is directed to young people, with the theme of "Keep the Faith Alive" (#2959). In addition, the Supreme Council office makes available vocations prayer cards, bookmarks, and booklets on several topics. All vocations materials can be found in Supplies Online, the supply ordering system found in Officers Online.

Vocations DVDs: Five award-winning video productions are available to councils on one DVD – all ideal for use in councils, parishes, or Catholic schools to promote vocations in the Church:

- *The Vocation to the Priesthood;* This film is ideal for viewing by those contemplating a call to the priesthood.
- *The Vocation to Marriage*; This film presents the teaching of the Church regarding Christian marriage and family. It is ideal for couples preparing for marriage.
- *The Vocation to Religious Life for Women*; This film promotes religious life for women in a contemporary and attractive medium. It is an effective tool for women contemplating a call to religious life.
- *The Vocation to Religious Life for Men*; This film promotes stories from men who are called to follow Christ as religious brothers, offering their lives in service to the church and its people.
- *The Vocation to the Laity;* This film shows how charity, the first principle of the Order, serves as a basis for the lay vocation.

Holy Hour for Vocations: Many state and local councils sponsor Holy Hours to pray for vocations. The format varies from parish to parish, but usually includes adoration of the Blessed Sacrament, recitation of the Rosary, Scripture readings, and other prayers. Vocations chairmen are encouraged to contact pastors to see if they would like to conduct Holy Hours in their parishes. The vocations committee should cooperate as requested in helping to organize the event. In particular, the committee can generate publicity to stimulate attendance. If it is not feasible to have a Holy Hour in a parish, perhaps Mass could be celebrated monthly for the intention of more priestly and religious vocations.

Vocations Awareness Days: An excellent way to heighten vocations awareness is by sponsoring Vocations Awareness Days at Catholic elementary and secondary schools and colleges. Councils have had tremendous success with these events. Usually, they feature visual displays for students in an auditorium, gym, or student union, with people from the diocesan vocations' office and religious institutes on hand to answer questions. The event can be an all-day affair or can be held during hours of free time. Refreshments offered in a congenial setting can help attract students, especially collegians. Publicity is essential. State and local vocations chairmen are encouraged to contact school officials about holding such events. Diocesan and religious institute vocations directors should be invited to participate, and the local bishop should be informed.

Poster and Essay Contests: Councils can sponsor essay and/or poster contests for students in Catholic elementary and secondary schools. Contestants prepare an original essay or original poster encouraging awareness of priestly and religious vocations. In doing so, their own vocations awareness increases. The judging should be carried out and the prizes awarded according to criteria established by the council or assembly.

Other Activities: Many state and local councils and individual Knights promote vocations in other ways. Some members take a young priest out to dinner every month to give him fraternal support. Others pay for vocation-related public advertising such as billboards. Councils and assemblies should be creative and take the initiative in promoting vocations. Naturally, whatever is done in the name of the Order must observe ecclesiastical norms and the policies of the Knights of Columbus.

Identification of accomplishments or achievements made during the fraternal year. Must have financially supported at least one seminarian through the RSVP Program. Assisting more will be taken under consideration. Selection will be determined by the evaluation committee.

COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES

Supreme Community Featured Community Programs

Habitat for Humanity: One of the featured programs for the Community Activities category for the Columbian Award is Habitat for Humanity. The following steps are required to participate:

- Contact your local Habitat for Humanity affiliate or visit their website at habitat.org for information on an affiliate in your area.
- Discuss with your affiliate the volunteer opportunities available for your Council.
- Involve the entire parish community in the project.
- Make it a family project and be sure to publicize the event. Invite those interested in joining your Council to participate.
- Report participation on Partnership Profile Report with Habitat for Humanity (#10092).
- Your Council must donate at least \$1,000.00 and 200 manhours to the project.

Global Wheelchair Mission: Another featured program for the Community Activities category is the Global Wheelchair Mission. The following steps are required to participate:

- Promote the program in your Council, parish, and community.
- Conduct targeted fund raisers with the proceeds going to the Global Wheelchair Mission.
- Hold information nights on the project to keep awareness up.
- Complete and submit the Global Wheelchair Report Form (#10071).
- Raise enough funds to purchase an entire container of 100 wheelchairs.

Coats for Kids

Today, eighteen percent of American children and fourteen percent of Canadian children live in poverty. As a result, many families cannot afford to provide even the necessity of a warm winter coat. Putting faith into action, Knights councils, since the program started in 2009, have purchased and distributed more than 500,000 new winter coats to children throughout North America.

This winter, consider getting your council involved in this great program. You can order coats by going on <u>Supplies Online</u>. Another option that your council can pursue is to run a parish/community-wide coat drive. Make sure to get information out to your community early enough to bring in the coats so that they can be distributed before the winter season is in full force. Nebraska's State 2021 Coat Drive is still in the planning stages. Plans are to have it in October 2021.

OTHER COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES

Your Council may receive credit **for two of the four** Community Activities on the Columbian Award by conducting one of these programs.

Some project suggestions are limited only by imagination, and here are some we suggest:

- Help elderly with website searches for medicines, medical insurance, and information.
- Set up a meeting with the county sheriff or other elected officials to arrange a prayer service, such as praying the rosary, with the prisoners at the county or city jail.
- Trunk or Treat at Halloween at church or public parking lots.
- Book clubs.
- Help at public functions such as county fairs.
- Create awareness by combining efforts with other service organizations and talking to city councils for needs.
- Provide rides to voting polls.
- Financially assist distressed individuals with monthly utility bills.
- Attend weather spotter training sessions and set up teams for severe weather.
- Work with local library to create computer skills class, designed for the elderly, to teach e-mail, Zoom, Facebook and other social networking skills.
- When motels are renovating rooms, inquire about box springs and mattresses for the poor and needy.

LEONARD FEEHAN MEMORIAL COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARD

First given out in 2007, this award is dedicated to the outstanding service that Leonard provided to his community as well as to the Knights of Columbus. Leonard was always looking for ways to better his community and help those who lived there. The Leonard Feehan Memorial Community Service Award is given in recognition to a Council that has gone out of its way to work with other community groups to improve a specific aspect of the community. Applications for this award will be available after the first of the year in the packet received by your Financial Secretary. Lastly, apply for Supreme and State Awards.

THE SILVER ROSE PROGRAM:

The State of Nebraska Knights of Columbus will receive the Silver Rose from the Colorado Knights of Columbus in August 2021 and will be transferred to the Kansas Knights of Columbus by one of our State Officers in September 2021. While the Silver Rose is in Nebraska, we are asking councils to schedule a prayer service as it makes its journey across the state. Each year, the Silver Rose makes its way across North America from Canada, through the United States, to Mexico. In 2001, Supreme Knight Carl A. Anderson expanded the program by beginning the "Running of the Rose" from the 119th Annual Meeting of the Supreme Council in Toronto. "The 'Running of the Rose' is a perfect program for the Knights of Columbus," said Supreme Knight Anderson. "Through it we honor not only Our Lady of Guadalupe and express the unity of the Order, but we also reaffirm the Order's dedication to the sanctity of human life. It is to the Blessed Mother that we turn in prayer as we work to end the Culture of Death that grips our society. As we think in terms of 'One Life, One Rose,' it is most appropriate that we turn to Our Lady of Guadalupe who made known her will through Juan Diego and the miracle of the roses." The Silver Rose program features a sculpted silver rose carried by Knights from Canada through the United States to Mexico, bringing the Culture of Life message on its journey. The Silver Rose is received at councils and parishes along its journey, and masses and prayer services are offered. Special border ceremonies with Fourth Degree honor guards are held when the rose is transferred from one state to another and internationally. Prayer books will be provided.

KNIGHT OF THE YEAR (KoY) / ROOKIE KNIGHT OF THE YEAR (RKofY)

Each council is asked to submit a **Knight of the Year and/or Rookie Knight of the Year**. This award is divided into two categories including Rookie Knight of the Year and Knight of the Year. The Rookie Knight of the Year recognizes a deserving Knight who has been a Knight for **less than five years as of March 1, 2022**. Recognizing that "new" Knight who has jumped in and been very involved from the beginning gives all Knights a model of energy and commitment. We also will recognize a deserving "Model Knight" who has been a member for **more than five years as of March 1, 2022** and exemplifies leadership and commitment for the work of the Order. The nominating form is easy to fill out and gives the council a chance to take pride in nominating one of its own. Nominations should explain why the Knight was chosen as a "Model Knight" in your council. In what ways does he show Brother Knights what is possible in the Knights of Columbus? Why does he deserve the distinction of being named State of Nebraska Knight of the Year? Explain the Knight's involvement in the council, church, and community. This form may be filled out on-line at www.nebraskakofc.org.

The ICC Major Activity Application is the way for a council to showcase outstanding achievements. This may fit into any category of Faith, Community, Family or Life. Activities are eligible to win an award in only one category. There will be one State and one Supreme Community Award in these four categories.

Most of our State athletic events will be taking place on a weekend, and it is likely that travelling to, and participating in these events will interfere with our members' usual Mass attendance. List Mass times at churches in the vicinity of the event, in all publications to assure our members make attending Mass a part of their travel plans.

Katelynne is an account manager for LinkedIn in Omaha, Alyssa is an Occupational Therapist for Sanford Hospital in Worthington, Minnesota, Christa is a manager for Children's Respite Care, in Omaha and Seth is a senior at Benedictine College in Atchison, Kansas, majoring in Theology and Evangelization. Mike and Mary have been married for 32 years, and both are Eucharistic Ministers for their parish, St. John the Baptist Catholic Church in Fort Calhoun.

SUPREME COUNCIL FEATURED LIFE PROGRAMS

Ultrasound Program:

A featured program within the Culture of Life Activities is the Ultrasound Program. A Council is eligible to receive one-half the cost of an ultrasound machine and receive credit **for two of the four** Life requirements for the Columbian Award. To participate in the Ultrasound Program your Council must:

- Raise at least one-half the cost of an ultrasound machine.
- Locate a pregnancy care center that is "pro-life" and prepared to receive, use, and maintain the ultrasound machine.
- Receive written approval from your Diocese.
- The center must be properly licensed under state and local laws, and a medical doctor must be affiliated with the center and oversee its operation.
- The medical personnel who will operate the ultrasound machine must be licensed and experienced. The center must have adequate insurance.
- The Council needs to complete and submit the *Ultrasound Initiative Application* (#10716).

**Note: If you have a facility in mind that may qualify for an ultrasound, please notify us so that we can help your council navigate through the paperwork.

March for Life: Counts for two of the four credits toward the Columbian Award.

The annual March for Life (normally held on January 22) in Washington, D.C., commemorates the anniversary of the U.S. Supreme Court infamous *Roe v Wade* decision that legalized abortion on January 22, 1973. Your Council can fulfill all four requirements for the Columbian Award. To participate in the March for Life your Council must do the following:

- Plan on attending your national or state March for Life.
- Organize your own community's March for Life with your Council.
- Be sure to advertise your Council's participation in the March for Life.
- Display the Knights of Columbus emblem during the march.
- Have a minimum of 100 total marchers.

- Complete and submit the Columbian Award Application (#SP-7) with the specific details on your Council's participation.
- Additional information as well as links to order prayers cards, posters and billboards can be found on Supreme's website. https://www.kofc.org/en/resources/faith-in-action-programs/life/march-for-life/10620-march-for-life-guidesheet.pdf

Special Olympics: As a featured program, your Council can receive **two of the four credits** toward the Columbian Award.

The requirements are as follows:

- Invite the local or regional Special Olympics director to your Council to explain what Special Olympics is doing in your community and what its needs are.
- Publicize the event in your Council, parish, and community.
- Host a fundraiser with proceeds going to Special Olympics.
- Coordinate your Council's volunteers the day of the games.
- Complete and submit the Partnership Profile Report with Special Olympics (#4584).
- Your Council must donate a minimum of \$2000.00 and 200 manhours to Special Olympics.

NEBRASKA CULTURE OF LIFE ACTIVITIES

One Rose, One Life Campaign:

One Rose, One Life is a State-run program where <u>ALL funds</u> collected must be submitted to the State Culture of Life Foundation.

The Nebraska Knights of Columbus One Rose, One Life campaign is Nebraska's prime source of income for Culture of Life. <u>All funds</u> collected will be used to support prolife organizations and activities throughout Nebraska. Our goal is 100% council participation. Thank you to those councils who have diligently participated in this campaign year after year. If your council has never participated, please consider it this year.

A major objective of the Culture of Life Foundation is to place ultrasounds in qualified pregnancy care centers throughout Nebraska. To date, One Rose, One Life funds have helped to purchase **fourteen** ultrasound machines in Nebraska.

In addition to the Ultrasound Initiative, many organizations, in all three Nebraska dioceses, benefit from this source of income. They include, but are not limited to, the Nebraska Catholic Conference, local Right-To-Life and Birthright chapters, and crisis pregnancy-help centers throughout Nebraska. We also support Nebraska Pro-Life Conference's Essay contest and the Culture of Life Art Contest with our funds. Councils also can receive funds for billboards (matching funds up to \$500/side) or for special prolife programs or needs.

If you know of an organization/council that would benefit from some of the One Rose, One Life funds, they must complete a "Request for Funds" form and return it to the Culture of Life Directors for consideration by the Board of Directors. The form is available on the Nebraska State Knights of Columbus website.

Prayer is the greatest action we can take in battling the culture of death. Only through prayer, fasting, and our witness to Christ's love will we be able to change the hearts and minds of the many people who support abortion on demand. The One Rose, One Life Prayer cards are a good reminder for the importance of continued prayers throughout the year, not just during the campaign.

Here is how you can make a difference:

- Choose a weekend for the campaign, typically on a weekend close to the anniversary of the U.S. Supreme Court's *Roe v. Wade* decision that legalized abortion on January 22, 1973.
- Appoint a chairman. This usually is your council's Culture of Life Chairman. Make sure that he will enthusiastically rally the council to become involved.
- Sample pulpit and bulletin announcements as well as a flyer can be found on the Nebraska K of C website, www.nebraskakofc.org.
- Determine how many prayer cards and envelopes your parish will need. Figure about two or three prayer cards per family as a rule of thumb. For envelopes, figure at least half the number of families in your parish.
- IMPORTANT: Let your District Deputy know how many prayer cards and envelopes you will need by October 15th, to allow ample time for printing, counting, and sorting. Cards and envelopes will be distributed to the DD's. Prayers cards are available in Spanish and English, so specify your desired number of each language.
- Contact your pastor and/or parish administrator early to get their approval of the target weekend. **IMPORTANT:** If this weekend conflicts with other church or council activities at your parish choose another weekend which will provide the most exposure. Ask your priest to support the fund drive in the parish bulletin and especially from the pulpit. A few words of encouragement from your priest are perhaps the single most important thing that will determine the success of your campaign. Try to have the prayer from the prayer card recited, either before, during, or after Mass.
- Make sure your chairman has an ample number of Knights to assist at each Mass to pass out prayer cards; before or after Mass is your council's decision. Envelopes can be passed out as well. There are some councils that put the envelopes at the end of each pew, and some insert them in their bulletins the week prior to their campaign. Money can be collected as a second collection (ask your pastor first), or you can hold out buckets or baskets after each Mass.
- Make sure you follow up your campaign efforts by placing a thank-you note in the paper or parish bulletin.
- All funds collected MUST be sent to the Knights of Columbus Culture of Life Foundation of Nebraska by March 1st for us to prepare convention reports and arrange for awards.
- First and second place awards are presented at the State Convention to the top two councils, that collect and turn in the highest dollar amount, in each division.
- The One Rose, One Life campaign is not to be used as a council fundraising activity. Our three bishops, along with other statewide Culture of Life/pro-life organizations, rely heavily on the money that is collected during this campaign. An excellent avenue to raise Culture of Life funds for local councils is the Buck-A-Month program.

Buck-A-Month

This is an excellent way to raise Culture of Life funds for your council. The Buck-A-Month program is open to anybody, not just Knights. Ask your friends, relatives, etc., or set up a table after Masses and enroll your parishioners. This activity could easily be your council's largest and most profitable prolife activity.

Culture of Life fundraiser. People will join; they just need to be asked! Many councils conduct projects and activities to generate funds to support their local Culture of Life organizations and educational projects. The Buck-A-Month program is a terrific and easy way to raise some of these funds.

- Participating councils are entitled to receive back <u>50%</u> of the total amount submitted to the Culture of Life Foundation.
- Buck-A-Month refund checks will be printed and returned to councils at the Nebraska Knights of Columbus Leadership Training Seminar in July.
- Funds returned to your council (if you participate in the Buck-A-Month program) can be used for your parish and local community Culture of Life projects and activities.
- The first place to look for potential Buck-A-Month members is from your council membership roster. Include a Buck-A-Month form with annual membership dues. A sample form is on our Nebraska K of C website www.nebraskakofc.org
- It is recommended that your council conduct its Buck-A-Month drive from January 1st to April 1st.
- When preparing to send contributions to the Culture of Life Foundation, clearly mark them as a <u>Buck-A-Month</u> submission and include your Council number. This will help to ensure that your council is credited properly, and the correct refund check amount is returned to your council. Funds not clearly marked as Buck-A-Month will be assumed as a One Rose, One Life contribution. Forward Buck-A-Month contributions to the Knights of Columbus, Culture of Life Foundation of Nebraska before July 1st.
- The suggested dollar amount for an individual membership is \$12 (Buck-A-Month); however, any amount is very much appreciated.

Culture of Life Supreme and State Service Awards Criteria

Commitment to the Culture of Life cause; from natural birth to natural death.

Culture of Life awards are given at the State Convention for outstanding Culture of Life activities that councils conduct during the previous fraternal year. The awards will be judged on the following:

- Detailed description of the project (e.g., diaper drive, pro-life prayer vigil).
- Manhours and number of Knights participating.
- Types of fundraisers to support the project or cause.
- The total funds raised for the Culture of Life cause (if applicable).
- Benefit to the recipients of the activity as well as the benefits to fostering a Culture of Life community.

NOMINATIONS FOR THESE AWARDS ARE DUE TO THE CULTURE OF LIFE DIRECTORS NO LATER THAN MARCH 1, 2022.

ADDITIONAL SUGGESTIONS FOR CULTURE OF LIFE ACTIVITIES:

- Raise money to support the state Culture of Life Ultrasound fund.
- Support the March for Life held each year in conjunction with the January anniversary of the *Roe v. Wade* decision of the U.S. Supreme Court legalizing abortion. Thousands of Culture of Life supporters march for life in Washington, D.C. demanding legislative protection for the unborn. Send a delegation from your council to the March for Life in Washington, D.C. or support youth groups that go to Washington, D.C. For more information visit http://www.marchforlife.org/ or follow them on Facebook at "The March for Life" and on Twitter @marchforlife.
- Join the Knights of Columbus, "Day of the Unborn Child" observed annually on the Feast of the Annunciation (March 25). Knights, and their families pray and fast to remind us of the importance and dignity of human life from the moment of conception to birth.
- Organize a new council Culture of Life program in your Council and submit your ideas, photos, details, and results to the State Culture of Life Foundation.
- Send letters or personally contact your chaplain, pastor, and members of the clergy offering whatever assistance they request in the fight against abortion.
- Promote and support the Order's Culture of Life efforts by displaying materials featuring the Culture of Life themes. "Defend Life" (billboard #1938) and a 13 x 20-inch sign (#4238) are available at no cost from the Supreme Council Supply Department the billboard consists of 12 sheets and measures 21 ½ x 9 ½ feet allow 4 weeks for delivery. Other Culture of Life materials are described in the Supply Catalog (#1264).

- With the permission of the pastors, conduct a Baby Bottle Campaign in local parishes by supplying baby bottles to parishioners asking them to take the bottles home and fill them with loose change and return them to the parish. Donate the monies collected to Culture of Life efforts in the local area.
- Distribute the Church's teachings on the sanctity of life as outlined in the *Study Guide to Evangelium Vitae* (#2914) prepared by the Knights of Columbus for groups and individuals who wish to become more familiar with the Church's teaching on the respect due human life as presented by Pope John Paul II. (Copies can be obtained for .25 each from the Supply Department).
- Contact Right-to-Life, Birthright, or other pro-life organizations in your area to coordinate programs with those already in existence by volunteering support, manpower, and finances.
- Create a public display of Pro-Life support by placing small white crosses on the lawn of your council home or parish, representing the number of lives lost to abortion locally each year.
- Promote letter-writing campaigns to state legislators expressing your views clearly, firmly, and courteously be courteous, ask questions and demand answers. For a listing of state senators go to www.nebraskalegislature.gov Click on Senators tab and follow the instructions to email them.
- Raise funds for Birthright and similar Pro-Life organizations which help encourage pregnant women to carry their babies to birth rather than to abort them. Volunteer manpower and services.
- Carry the Pro-Life message to youth through the religious formation programs, high schools, colleges, FOCUS (Fellowship of Catholic University Students), etc. by delivering speeches, distributing literature, and sponsoring Pro-Life essay and poster contests.
- Voice your disapproval of programs aired on radio and television stations that do not depict a Catholic view on human dignity. Request that equal time be dedicated to programs displaying Culture of Life values.
- Erect a memorial to children killed through abortion.
- Support homes and facilities for unwed mothers in your area by fund-raising activities, drives to collect diapers and other layette items for newborns, and providing volunteers to help with facility maintenance and upkeep.
- Pray the Rosary to end abortion a simple, yet effective act that can have enormous impact (a poster urging the recitation of the Rosary as a weapon against abortion (#2073) and a prayer card with a prolife prayer on the back (#2072) are available at no charge from the Supply Department.
- Ask the pastors of the parishes your council serves if Knights can lead a Rosary for Life before Masses in October Respect Life Month and on the weekend closest to January 22, the anniversary of the *Roe v. Wade* decision of the U.S. Supreme Court legalizing abortion.

SUPREME COUNCIL FEATURED FAMILY PROGRAM

Food for Families Program: The featured program for the Family Activities category of the Columbian Award is Food for Families. If your Council participates in Food for Families, it may be eligible to receive a refund for qualifying donations and credit for all four Family Activity requirements of the Columbian Award. To participate in the program your Council must do the following:

- Contact your local food pantry or parish soup kitchen to ensure that they will be able to receive the food and ask what their specific needs are.
- Display posters / flyers promoting the event around your parish and community.
- Provide adequate receptacles for donated items and make sure they are emptied frequently.
- A minimum of \$500.00 or 1,000 pounds of food must be contributed. Contributions are cumulative, so the Council can make multiple contributions to reach the minimum dollar or pounds required.
- Complete the Food for Families Reimbursement Program Application (#10057) and submit to Supreme.

BUILDING THE DOMESTIC CHURCH

There are two programs that fall under the State Family Activities banner. They are:

- The Family Fully Alive This is a twelve-month program that promotes family prayer with meditations and scripture readings. It is to be promoted within the parish with the Council's participation.
- Father's Day Affirmation of Wedding Vows This can be a special ceremony either during or after Mass and can be held with Corporate Communion. It is to be led by Catholic husbands and fathers.

SUPREME RECOMMENDED FAMILY PROGRAMS

Food for Families (Featured Program), Family of the Month/Year, Keep Christ in Christmas, Family Fully Alive, Family Week, Consecration to the Holy Family (Required Program), Family Prayer Night and Good Friday Family Promotion. There are many other Family programs that your Council can do and include the following:

- Celebrate Knights of Columbus Family week with a family Mass, picnic, dinner, or other activities that both promote and highlight the family.
- Participate in the Order's Family of the Month program, honoring Council families who exemplify the values taught by our Church and our Order. Full details are provided in the Family of the Month booklet (#1993) provided to each Council. Make sure to recognize your Family of the Month in your church bulletin and in the local media.
- Promote Fathers for Good. The centerpiece of the initiative is an interactive website, fathersforgood.com, which offers the St. Joseph Series booklets for men and can be ordered online.
- Organize family Corporate Communion breakfasts that bring together Council and parish families.
- Plan an annual marriage vow renewal program for couples in your Council and parish.

Family of the Year Awards

Choose a family (1st Place and Runner-up) from your council whom you believe truly reflect the traditions and relationships and fabric of the Holy Family. Be specific and detailed in your explanation so that your nomination addresses the following:

- Demonstrates how the family members are interdependent and share with one another and their parish family.
- Focuses on the entire family, parents, and children alike, and how the family lives out and shares their Catholic faith.
- Shows the way the family lives their lives reinforcing the message of the Church. Shows how the family makes other people's lives better.
- Include a photograph of the family as part of the nomination.

YOUTH ACTIVITIES

The future of our faith, our religion, our church, and even the Knights of Columbus itself rests with the youth of today. Therefore, as members of the Knights, we need to take an active role in supporting our youth, providing opportunities for them to learn our holy religion, and to provide them with quality examples of Christian lifestyles. As members and families of the Knights of Columbus we have a long-standing tradition of supporting youth at the Council, District, State, and Supreme levels with programs for youth of all ages and backgrounds.

Knights of Columbus Soccer Challenge: Saturday, October 23, 2021, at the Schuyler Field House. The newest program for youth is the Knights of Columbus Soccer Challenge. As a state, Nebraska offers this program to boys and girls ages 9 to 14 (based on their age on September 1). This competition is open to all youth, no matter if they attend a Catholic school or not. Make sure to take advantage of this and involve youth from neighboring public schools and the community around your parish.

The contest will be divided into four levels of competition: Council, District, Regional, and State. State winners will be forwarded on to the Supreme office for consideration at the international level. Over the last several years, approximately 30 councils across the state participated in the Knights of Columbus Soccer Challenge, which roughly translates to just 20% of the councils in the Nebraska Jurisdiction. Council competitions should be held sometime during the end of August or early September, with Districts taking place by the end of September. Regional competitions should be scheduled for early October. The State Knights of Columbus Soccer Challenge will take place on October 23rd. All the information that you need to run your Council competition can be found in the Knights of Columbus Soccer Challenge Kit. Kit and program guide sheets can be ordered at Officers Online. This kit can be ordered by your Grand Knight, Deputy Grand Knight, Council Youth Director, or your Council Knights of Columbus Soccer Challenge Chairman, and will be provided to your council free of charge.

If you feel that your council will not have enough participants to hold your own local competition, consider working with a nearby council or councils, combining your manpower, while still providing the opportunity for the youth you serve to participate in the Knights of Columbus Soccer Challenge. If you are going to be doing this, please make sure that you clearly mark all the entry forms for the respective councils and that each council participating fills out its own participation report form to submit to the state. If you have any concerns or questions about running the Knights of Columbus Soccer Challenge in your council, please make sure to contact the State Youth Director.

Knights of Columbus Free Throw Contest: April 9th, 2022, at GI Central Catholic HS

The Knights of Columbus Free Throw Contest is a tried and proven program to involve our youth and families in the Knights of Columbus. Make sure to start your preparations for this event early enough to ensure that you can contact youth prior to the Christmas holiday by placing posters and fliers in the schools. Just like the Knights of Columbus Soccer Challenge, the Knights of Columbus Free Throw Contest is open to boys and girls ages 9 to 14 (this is based on their age on January 1). The competition is also open to youth both in Catholic schools and public schools. The contest is again divided into four levels: Council, District, Regional, and State. State winners will be submitted to the Supreme office for consideration in the international competition.

Council level competitions should be held during January and the District competition should be held during the early part of February. Regional competitions should be scheduled for the later part of February or the early part of March. The State competition is on April 9, 2022, All of the information that you need to run your event can be found online. Knights of Columbus Free Throw Contest Kit and program guide sheets and can be ordered along with additional program material via Officers Online. This kit will be provided to your council free of charge.

If you feel that your council will not have enough participants to hold your own local competition, consider working with a nearby council or councils, combining your manpower, while still providing the opportunity for the youth you serve to participate in the Knights of Columbus Free Throw Contest. Please make sure that you clearly mark all the entry forms for the respective councils and that each council participating fills out its own participation report form to submit to the state. If you have any concerns or questions about running the Knights of Columbus Free Throw Contest in your council, please contact the State Youth Director.

Knights of Columbus Substance Abuse Awareness Poster Contest:

The Knights of Columbus Substance Abuse Awareness Poster Contest is another longstanding program that helps address the ongoing issue of substance abuse, both drugs and alcohol, in our communities. Start your preparations for this event early enough to ensure that your council can submit the council finalists to your respective District Deputy by **February 1**. This year we are encouraging all councils to host their Council level competition to coincide with Red Ribbon Week at their school(s). This may mean having a few different dates depending on how many schools you are running the contest in. Make sure that your Council Youth Director or Grand Knight sends a letter to each school (or family) explaining the importance of this contest. We feel that by running the Knights of Columbus Substance Abuse and Awareness Poster Contest during Red Ribbon Week at the schools, we will be able to increase our participation and give the participants a better understanding of why we are running this contest.

The Knights of Columbus Substance Abuse Awareness Poster Contest is broken into two age categories including ages 8 through 11 and ages 12 through 14 (based on age as of January 1). Each age category can then design an original poster on one of two topics: Substance Awareness and Abuse or Drug Awareness and Abuse. The Knights of Columbus Substance Abuse Awareness Poster Contest is open to boys and girls attending either a Catholic school or a public school. This contest will be split into three competition levels: Council, District, and State. State winners will be submitted to the Supreme office for consideration in the international competition.

Here are some specific rules that you need to keep in mind when running your K of C Substance Abuse Awareness Poster Contest:

- The poster needs to be about Alcohol Awareness and Abuse or Drug Awareness and Abuse.
- Each poster must be an original work of art.

- Posters must be on 11x17 paper. Posters using pastels, chalk, or charcoal must be laminated or covered in clear plastic.
- Each poster must have an accompanying Knights of Columbus Substance Abuse Awareness Poster Contest entry form with the entrant's name and age as well as a council number.
- Entries become the property of the Knights of Columbus State Council and will not be returned.

Your council should begin promoting the Knights of Columbus Substance Abuse Awareness Poster Contest at the beginning of the school year to give students as much time as possible to work on their posters. Council level competitions should be held during Red Ribbon Week at your participating schools, and the top two posters in each topic and age category must be submitted to the District Deputy by February 1. Posters from the Council level competitions should not be submitted directly to the State Youth Director. The district competition should be held during the early part of February with the top two posters in each topic and age category being sent to the State Youth Director by **no later than March 1.** All of the information that you need to run your event can be found in the Knights of Columbus Substance Abuse Awareness Poster Contest Kit that your council can order using the form located at http://www.kofc.org/un/en/forms/council/SA-KITOnline.pdf. This kit will be provided to your council free of charge.

Knights of Columbus Keep Christ in Christmas Poster Contest:

Each year during the Advent and Christmas season, as Knights, we urge members of our parish and community to remember that it is "CHRISTMAS" and that the reason for the season is the birth of our Savior. Let's take this one step further and help remind our youth why we celebrate the season of Christmas. We may also be able to learn something from our youth that will help remind us why we celebrate the blessed season of Christmas. Over the past few years, the Nebraska Knights of Columbus have handed out awards for the Knights of Columbus Keep Christ in Christmas Poster Contest at the State Convention. Supreme has created an official packet and guidelines for this contest. It can be found under Church Activities (with the Keep Christ in Christmas Cards) on the Supreme website. Consider having this event run by your Church Director and your Youth Director.

If you are running your Knights of Columbus Substance Abuse and Awareness Poster Contest in conjunction with Red Ribbon Week, this should give you most of November and December to promote and receive entries for the Keep Christ in Christmas Poster Contest. Consider handing out prizes for the top poster(s). Talk to your pastor about displaying the posters in the church vestibule and school hallways during the Christmas season. Winning submissions from the Council level competitions must be submitted to the respective District Deputy by February 1, for judging. Posters from the Council level competitions should not be submitted directly to the State Youth Director. After judging at the district level, District Deputies should send their submissions to the State Youth Director **NO LATER THAN March 1**.

The rules and regulations for the Knights of Columbus Keep Christ in Christmas Poster Contest are very similar to those of the Knights of Columbus Substance Abuse and Awareness Poster Contest. If you are considering running this contest at your school, or if you have any questions about it, please contact your District Deputy or the State Youth Director.

Suggestions and Ideas for Youth Activities:

Trunk-or-Treat: On Halloween, consider hosting a trick-or-treat event in the parking lot of your church. This will give parents and children a safe place to trick-or-treat while still enjoying the spirit of Halloween; all the families need to do is stop by the trunk of the cars in the parking lot. Have members of your council bring candy, decorations, and games, and make this an event that kids will enjoy year after year.

Religious Emblem Program for Boy and Girl Scouts: The Boy and Girl Scout programs each provide opportunities for youth to learn about their religion through the Scouting program. With the recent changes in society, this is a great opportunity to reach out to the youth in your parish and your community and help them understand our holy religion and the practices of the Catholic Church.

Consider sponsoring a class (or classes) for the members of your parish who are involved in either the Boy or Girl Scouts to help them earn these awards and learn more about the Catholic Church. If any members of your council are involved in either the Boy Scouts or the Girl Scouts, this would be a great opportunity to get them involved in your Youth Activities by having them teach, or help teach, these classes. If your parish does not currently have a Boy Scout or Girl Scout program for the youth, consider sponsoring a unit or co-sponsoring a unit with a neighboring parish. Recruit members of your council to serve as leaders, especially those whose children are involved in the program. If you are interested in offering a Religious Emblem Program class or sponsoring a new unit in your parish, but your pastor has questions, feel free to contact the State Youth Director. Contacts can be made, and a meeting set up with your parish pastor to explain the Religious Emblem Program and the purpose of the Boy Scout or Girl Scout program.

INTELLECTUAL DISABILITIES ACTIVITIES

2021 Campaign for People with Intellectual Disabilities (formerly known as the Tootsie Roll Drive) The work the Nebraska Knights of Columbus do to assist individuals with intellectual disabilities is funded through the Knights of Columbus Campaign for People with Intellectual Disabilities (formerly identified more often as the Tootsie Roll Drive). Tootsie Rolls are still the main symbol of this drive, but the Supreme Council wants to emphasize the reason for the fundraising more in the name of the annual drive. While the Knights of Columbus Campaign for People with Intellectual Disabilities is a mouthful, it really does communicate clearly who the Knights are raising funds to assist.

Here are some frequently asked questions concerning the Knights of Columbus Campaign for the People with Intellectual Disabilities and how the money that is raised is allocated.

Who should receive the money raised? State Intellectual Disabilities Directors, <u>Sammi and Stephen Lowery</u>, <u>1301 Thunderbird Blvd</u>, <u>Lincoln</u>, <u>NE 68512</u>, should receive 100% of the money collected in the local drive along with the required reporting forms and the local Council's request for its half of the funds. Funds and reports are **due by January 31**, 2022, for a council to be eligible for awards at the annual State Convention.

How does a Council qualify for Intellectual Disabilities awards at the Nebraska State Convention? There are two categories of awards given at the State Convention: percentage gain and most money raised by division. In order to be eligible for these awards, all money raised, and reports must be received by January 31, 2022. To be considered for the percentage gain awards, councils must have participated in the 2020 and 2021 Knights of Columbus Campaigns for People with Intellectual Disabilities Drive and must have submitted all required forms and money for both drives on time. Awards for most money raised will be based on the 2021 Knights of Columbus Campaign for People with Intellectual Disabilities only and all money and reports must be submitted on time.

Who can the funds go to? The following is a partial list of groups who have benefited from the Knights of Columbus Campaign for People with Intellectual Disabilities in the past: Madonna School, Villa Marie, ARC of Nebraska, Special Olympics, Ollie Webb Center, Mosaic, and SMILE. Basically, any non-profit group who works with individuals with intellectual disabilities is eligible to receive money raised through the Knights of Columbus Campaign for People with Intellectual Disabilities. PLEASE NOTE: school districts, educational service units, and individual recipients are not eligible to receive funds. If you have questions regarding eligibility, please contact the Intellectual Disabilities Directors.

Where are the forms to order Tootsie Rolls? You can find the order form in the packet that Grand Knights received at the at the Leadership Training Seminar in July or the state website (www.nebraskakofc.org). You can also email the Intellectual Disabilities Directors Sammi and Stephen Lowery (sglowery82@gmail.com), call them at 402-540-1670, or contact your District Deputy for replacements.

Where are the reporting forms to use when a Council sends in its money? Reporting forms can be found in the packet that Grand Knights received at the Leadership Training Seminar in July or the state website (www.nebraskakofc.org). You can also email the Intellectual Disabilities Directors Sammi and Stephen Lowery (sglowery82@gmail.com), call them at 402-540-1670, or contact your District Deputy. These forms are due with the money by January 31, 2022.

When is this year's drive? October 15-17, 2021.

Can the local Council change the dates of the Knights of Columbus Campaign for People with Intellectual Disabilities Drive? Local councils can change the date to adjust for community needs.

When is the money due? <u>ALL FUNDS</u> collected in the Knights of Columbus Campaign for People with Intellectual Disabilities are due to <u>Intellectual Disabilities Directors</u>, <u>Sammi and Stephen Lowery</u>, <u>1301</u> <u>Thunderbird Blvd</u>, <u>Lincoln</u>, <u>NE 68512</u>, by <u>January 31</u>, <u>2022</u>. Checks should be made out to K of C Intellectual Disabilities Foundation of Nebraska, Inc.

Can local councils keep their share of the funds raised? No, councils <u>MUST SEND ALL</u> the funds collected, along with the required report, to the Intellectual Disabilities Directors. On the reporting form, councils can identify the group(s) to whom they would like to donate their portion (up to 50%) of the funds raised, and then the Intellectual Disabilities Directors will write and distribute the checks accordingly.

How can we find groups that serve people with intellectual disabilities? Asking families who have children with intellectual disabilities for the names of groups who provide services or activities for the children is a good way to begin the search for a deserving group. The information packet that Grand Knights received at the Leadership Training Seminar in July as well as the state website (www.nebraskakofc.org) also contain a list of approved groups, addresses, and websites.

How do we get more vests and canisters? There is a vest order form on the state website (www.nebraskakofc.org) and in the information packet Grand Knights received at the Leadership Training Seminar. With every 16 cases of Tootsie Rolls ordered, a case of 12 canisters is included if the appropriate box is checked on the Tootsie Roll order form (also included on the state website and in the Leadership Seminar Packet).

FINANCIAL SECRETARIES' INFORMATION

The Financial Secretary's (& Faithful Comptroller's) duties are numerous and very important to the Council/Assembly. Below is information concerning the most important tools, tasks, and reminders.

Supreme Videos: There are several training videos found on the Supreme Website that explain numerous FS tasks. Here is a link to the Fraternal Video Library: https://www.kofc.org/en/videos/fraternal-training-library.html

"Leadership Resources": The basic duties of an FS and FC are explained in the "Leadership Resources" (#5093) beginning on page 27. This is your "go to" document. The PDF version can be found in the Officer Resources and can be downloaded directly to your computer. This should be your first point of reference in resolving a problem. If you cannot find the answer, call your FS Coordinator listed above in this section. For specific information about a particular Knight's record not in your Member Management, it may be necessary to contact the Supreme Office.

Officers Online: Supreme has a Training Mode for the FS/FC in Member Management. The "Training" mode allows you to use the different functions of MM/MB without impacting the data base or current reports on file. You can also print reports to see what the results will display i.e., vouchers. The word TRAINING will be printed over the printed product on the reports as well as appearing in the upper righthand corner of the screen until you return to live mode.

New Financial Secretaries Training: Financial Secretaries and Faithful Comptrollers can be appointed any time during the year. Our commitment to new FSs/FCs is to get them up to speed as quickly as possible. Focused training is provided during the GK/FS training meeting in July and during the State Convention. New FS's/FC's Should attend one of these sessions if possible. Additionally, the FS Coordinator would be happy to provide one-on-one training where practical anytime. Notify the FS Coordinator when you are in place.

Submit Reports on Time: Be sure to submit required reports on time. Refer to the Executive Secretary section of the Program Book, the State Council website nebraskakofc.org and Supreme Council website www.kofc.org. Supreme reports and forms due will also be posted on your Council Statement received from Supreme each month and on your council Reports Online page.

Perhaps the most important items due from the FS & FC are the Semiannual Audit Report due February 15 and August 15, the Survey of Fraternal Activity due January 31, and the payment of Supreme and State Assessments. If you submit a report online that does not contain a block for the e- mail address for the Executive Secretary, District Deputy, and yourself, download a copy and forward it as an attachment by email to them, i.e., Report of Officers, Service Program Personnel.

Online Report/Member Management: The Grand Knight/Faithful Navigator, Financial Secretary/Faithful Comptroller, Advocate/Faithful Pilot have access to the Officers Online section of the Order's website. The Reports Online section of Officers Online provides the ability to view council/assembly records such as the roster, membership statistics, and support materials. The GK/FN and FS/FC have access to Member Management, but only the FS/FC has access to Member Billing. The GK/FN and Advocate/Faithful Pilot have access to the Orders Bylaws online. Once the Supreme Council office records the new officers in its database, an Invitation Code is generated for each eligible officer. Additional information is contained in the FS/FC Handbook under General Information.

It is recommended that you order an additional FS/FC Handbook (no cost) and provide it to your GK/FN as well as your trustees and membership director. Information concerning council/assembly audits and other related reports will be of great benefit to them.

On the Supreme Online Report, you will find rosters for your council/assembly in PDF and EXCEL, Publications, Look Ahead for reports due, and Support Materials, all of which can be printed or saved to your computer.

"Moving Notice" and Other Forms: The "Moving Notice" is a form that, when used, can help reduce the number of members in your council/assembly that have moved out of your council/assembly and are no longer paying their dues. By completing this notice and sending to the council/assembly where the member has moved, you can help promote the transfer process. If the member has moved out of state, you may send the form to the Nebraska State Deputy and he will forward it to the appropriate State Deputy in the member's new state. The form and many other forms can be found on the State Website (www.nebraskakofc.org) under the "Resources" menu.

Most of the forms used by the FS/FC are available on the State website or on the Supreme website and can be obtained through the Supreme Supply Catalog. One exception is the "Moving Notice". This is only available on the State website or from the FS Coordinator Co-Chairmen.

As the Service Program Personnel Report (#365) is being completed, ensure that all member email addresses are accurate. Armatus, the Order's Safe Environment partner, will use these email addresses to send email notifications to the program directors and chairs who are required to complete safe environment training and to provide authorization for a background check. Directors and chairs should look for email notifications from Armatus in their inbox or spam folder. These will provide assigned username and password to complete the required training and the link necessary to provide background check authorization. The Knights of Columbus covers all costs associated with these requirements. Please work with your Grand Knight and the State Advocate to ensure your Council is compliant with the Youth Protection Training.

STATE EVENT COORDINATOR CO-CHAIRMAN PAT RUPP

STATE MEETING INFORMATION

The State Convention Coordinator Co-Chairs are charged with the duties of gathering and compiling reservations and then securing the rooms and meals for the three State meetings held each year. These meetings are Leadership Training (Grand Knight) Seminar, Mid-Year Conference, and the State Convention. In doing so, they must keep track of 200 – 450 meal tickets and 150 – 300 room assignments for the Knights, their wives, families, and State guests.

Following are some simple ideas that would greatly help them to do their job better and ensure that you have a wonderful time at all our meetings:

- Read the instructions thoroughly. Pay special attention to the date that registrations need to be returned. The hotels have strict timetables about cutoff dates, and we want to make sure that you have a room. Also make sure that you send it to the proper people. We are now handling all three meetings, so the reservations come to us and not to Ray Guggenberger. Ray has enough to do trying to answer all our questions without having to forward reservations also.
- Please print your name clearly where it says, "Print Name". It makes it a lot easier when we have a lot of reservations to go through. Also please put your full title/position down. If you are a DD, please include your District number; again, it makes it easier for us to make sure of the billing and that you get a room and food.
- Make sure that you include yourself in the number of meals if you have someone else with you. If you and your wife or a friend will be having dinner and you just put down 1 (for them) and assume that we know that you will be eating also, someone is not getting dinner. If you are married, we assume that it will be you not eating.
- If you do not plan to attend the meeting, send your reservation in anyway, showing that you are not planning to attend. This would save us having to call you to see if you just forgot.
- Have the Councils send their reservations in together as a Council. That way they do not get mixed up and the tickets are given to someone else.
- Checks are payable to "Nebraska Knights of Columbus".
- Have a good time at the meetings. It is a time to learn, to visit with old friends, and to make new ones. We are all family here, blessed to be Knights and to belong to the greatest organization in the world.

STATE PUBLIC RELATIONS CHAIRMAN RON GOODRICH

In his eighteenth year as co-publisher of the *Nebraska Knights Courier*, Ron Goodrich has again accepted the position of Public Relations Chairman for the State Council. Along with his wife, Duffi, Ron continues to be responsible to oversee and produce four issues of *Knights Courier* (annually) and many other volunteer print projects. He will also oversee and produce any other publications/printed pieces the State Officers, Directors, and Chairmen deem a priority.



This fraternal year, Ron will also be responsible to oversee a monthly reminder to councils to submit any publicity done the previous month to promote the Knights and their council programs. Submitting these informal reports will help councils earn points toward the Public Relations Award presented each year at the State Convention.

Ron is a member of Fr. William A. Foster Council 9518, Ralston, since 1990. He became a Fourth-Degree member of Assembly 3431, Archbishop Gerald T. Bergan, Omaha, in June of 2008. Also active in parish and community life, Ron has served on the St. Gerald Parish Council, the Building Committee, as a mentor in the RCIA Program, and a RENEW coordinator. He was also a youth leader in the Godparent Program, visited homebound for over 10 years to take them the Eucharist, created and headed the parish parking lot and lock-up security patrols, and was a youth baseball coach and Cub Scout leader.

Ron currently visits homebound parishioners, provides rides to weekend Masses, and spends an hour weekly at Eucharistic Adoration in the parish chapel. A 29-year veteran of the Omaha Police Department, Ron and Duffi, his wife of 50 years, have owned their own business for the past 28 years.

PUBLIC RELATIONS

Publicity and Public Relations: Public relations is an important component of the Knights of Columbus. Public relations, in its broadest sense, is the art of making the public aware of the following:

- What an organization is doing.
- Why it is doing it.
- The people it serves.
- How it contributes to the welfare of the entire community.

Through communication, we can inform people about the activities of the Knights and when these activities will be taking place. By doing this, we can motivate our members to get involved in the Council through participation in the activities and through individual action. We can give our members a sense of responsibility and pride. We can also make recruitment easier since more people will be familiar with what our organization is and what we are doing.

For your council to earn any publicity award points, the specific items must be brought to the attention of the PR Chairman.

Publicize Your Events: Create a year-long calendar with the planned events, adding more as they occur. Assign a member the task of handling the PR for each event and the responsibly to make an ongoing list of publicity to be sent to the state PR chair by the March 1 deadline. Members responsible for the communication of council activities should also acquaint themselves with the appropriate people at the diocesan and local newspapers, radio, and television stations.

Always write a news release about each event and send to diocesan and local newspapers.

When writing news releases for the press or providing the newspaper staff with information, always remember to give them background information. The information should include the who, what, when, where, why, and how of the local program or project. Publicize the event well in advance through whatever other media is appropriate (parish bulletin, pulpit announcement, flyers and posters, newspapers, radio/TV community calendars). Always be sure to include the name of a contact person and his phone and email.

Assign someone to take as many photos as possible. (Please check out the photo publishing policy at http://nebraskakofc.org), take notes and get comments from participants, the Grand Knight and any VIPs. Events such as the kickoff of the Tootsie Roll® Drive, an annual fish fry, or recognition of council award winners might offer special visual appeal, and therefore, special efforts should be made to get a photo of these activities.

If you use your mobile phone or tablet to take these photos, take the photos at the highest quality possible. If you're outdoors, make sure the sun is not in the eyes of the subjects and that they remove their hats and sunglasses.

Write a summary and publicize in the same manner as you did in "advance" the results of the event (money raised, benefactors, community enjoyment) as is appropriate. Consider sending your final article to Supreme for one of their online publications or *Columbia* magazine. Even if you are politely rejected, keep trying after each event. Instructions on how to write and send articles and photos can be found at http://www.kofc.org/un/en/columbia/index.html.

Council Newsletter: An editor should be appointed for the council newsletter. He should have a sense of organization. His duties are to get items of interest, possibly solicit advertisements, and oversee the layout of the publication. A single copied sheet is the simplest format. More elaborate council newsletters may be used. The choice of format usually depends on the budget and the volume of available news. If the publication is to be printed, it may be financed through the acceptance of carefully chosen advertisements. Many councils choose to send their issues through email or post them online on the council website.

Council Website: A council website is important, not only for current members, but for anyone in your area seeking information about the Knights. Your council webmaster should have a basic knowledge of working with a website. Often members ask their children to help. It's also important to keep your website current. A website is only as good as its information.

Other Tools: When using other media pieces, make sure you are identified as the Knights of Columbus. For example, roadside signs and banners need to at least display the 3rd Degree emblem, but it would be best to have the council's name and location (e. g. Knights of Columbus Council 1234, Omaha).

DON'T WAIT UNTIL MARCH 1, 2022, TO SUBMIT! It is not necessary to wait until March 1 to send any publicity information for award consideration. Send any publicity with the form or other list on a monthly or quarterly basis, and we will keep track.
