Support Citizens with Intellectual Disabilities Week October 12-18, 2025

As the summer draws to a close we start to look ahead to the many activities we enjoy each fall. From football games to trips to the pumpkin patch, we all have activities that bring our families closer this time of year. One activity to consider adding to your annual list is the Campaign for People with Intellectual Disabilities.

Brother Knight and Governor Jim Pillen has been asked to sign a proclamation declaring the week of October 12-18, 2025, as "Support Citizens with Intellectual Disabilities Week" in the state of Nebraska. To follow suit, the State Council has designated October 12th to 18th as the official dates for the campaign, but each Council is welcome to pick dates based on their availability. We are also fortunate to receive proclamations from many local mayors supporting our event this year.

The 2024 Campaign for People with Intellectual Disabilities was extremely successful, raising over \$175,000 to support the organizations across the state of Nebraska serving those with intellectual and developmental disabilities These (IDD). organizations vary from educational facilities such as Villa Marie and Madonna School to those helping adults with transitional services to learn the skills to make day-to-day life easier and be competitively employed such as MOSAIC,

Duet, the Southwest Area Training Services and many others.

Other organizations such as ARC help individuals and families locate and take advantage of the many services available in Nebraska to those who have IDD. Places like S.M.I.L.E. Inc., Buckboard Riding Academy and Camp Scott provide therapeutic services and the ability for individuals and families to experience life to its fullest potential and enjoy the recreation that many take for granted. Special Olympics Nebraska, as well as its local chapters, provide athletes with the opportunity to showcase their abilities and compete in local, regional, state and national competitions.

As you can see, a wide variety of programs and services receive support from the Intellectual Disabilities Foundation. None of this is possible without our Councils.

This year we have the goal of raising over \$200,000 through the Campaign for People with Intellectual Disabilities. In order for that to happen, we need all of our Councils to participate. This can be through the "traditional" campaign and distributing candy, by hosting a parish breakfast where the proceeds are donated to the Campaign, by partnering with local businesses to do a "kick back" program, and many other options.

Legislative Corner

During this Jubilee of Hope, Pope Leo XIV has addressed numerous pilgrims around the world who have traveled to Rome. Many of them have come for specific mini-jubilees within the grand Jubilee, such as the Jubilee for Youth or the Jubilee of People with Disabilities. Another of those jubilees was the Jubilee of Governments, which had as its aim the bringing together of governmental leaders to discuss issues of peace and justice as they reflect on the Church's mission and teachings.

In his address to Jubilee of Government pilgrims, Pope Leo XIV drew on the wisdom of Catholic social teaching when he told attendees that "politics is the highest form of charity." Interesting, but what does this mean? In some sense, this statement almost seems controversial. After all, aren't there higher forms of charity, such as laying one's life down for another? Those are fair questions, so let's explore what Pope Leo was getting at.

Far too often, the word "politics" is seen as a dirty word or something people don't want to get involved with. Politics is perceived as some sort of selfish enterprise for those seeking profit or gain for themselves. At best, sometimes politics serves the community, but otherwise it is too often corrupt.

But in telling us that "politics is the highest form of charity," Pope Leo is reminding us of the dignity of politics. Politics is, in fact, a beautiful activity and pivotal to building up the common good. Properly understood, politics takes us out of ourselves into service of our community. It provides us an opportunity to demonstrate love for God, by properly ordering our communities toward Him, and to demonstrate our love for neighbor, by ensuring that our communities properly serve those in need. And, after all, aren't these the two great commandments that all the laws and prophets are built on?

So, next time you get frustrated with politics and want to give up on it, take a moment to reflect on this wisdom of the Holy Father and allow it to restore within your mind and heart a proper vision of politics.



for us, but can you even begin to imagine the private, intimate questions that the disciples and apostles asked Jesus? Conversations about life, about wives and children, about work, and about the future. Each conversation, each question growing more serious, more intimate, more intense as the days, weeks and years passed. Do you have friendships like this?

Today's world does not always provide the opportunities for men to build these intimate, long lasting friendships. Each of us is so busy with family, work, sports, and so many other things that having, or taking, time to build friendship is not available.

What if there was an hour once a week or once a month where all those obligations could be put aside and where men could become brothers, bonding and learning to love and support each other as well as building an eternal relationship with our Lord Jesus Christ? COR is that safe place, that tranquil, supportive, understanding place where men can open up about their cares and their fears, where men can learn together about our Catholic faith and how that faith can sustain each of us in our daily lives.

COR, Christ Centered Fellowship, provides a safe, healing, nurturing, place for men to build bonds of trust. Trust is essential for building bonds. Those bonds are essential to promote true sharing. Sharing one's deepest fears, thoughts and concerns builds friendships that can be counted on no matter the situation. This is the same type of trust that Jesus wants us to have in Him.

Fr. McGivney knew that this trust, this friendship, had to be developed and nurtured to grow, and he knew that the Knights of Columbus was a way to do that. By preserving and growing the Catholic faith, Fr. McGivney provided a way to strengthen men in their faith and through that make them better fathers.

Offer COR to the men of your parish, Knight or not. Give every Catholic man a place to grow in faith, fellowship and prayer. Through COR our Catholic faith can become the bedrock of a Christ centered society.

Growth through Evangelization

At the summer Leadership Training Seminar, the Membership team noted the opportunity of new members based on the 2020 United States Census Demographic. The most recent census stated there are over 165,000 men 18 years of age or older in Nebraska who are Catholic.

There are a little less than 27,000 current Nebraska Knights of Columbus. The numbers would indicate there is an opportunity in Nebraska for 138,000 additional Knights!

Seems a bit unreal, doesn't it? So where are they? How can we connect with them?

Evangelization is the answer! Sometimes we view evangelization only in the context of those that are not Catholic, which is good. However, we should also evangelize with those that are Catholic. Caring conversations with Catholics to deepen their faith, increase their active practice, and encourage them to fully, and publicly, live their Catholic faith will build our parishes and the Order.

At the end of Mass, we are "sent forth." I encourage all brother Knights to be prepared and willing to engage with men inviting them to church, to the parish community, to the Order. There are many materials available in your parishes and from Supreme to assist you in these conversations. 'Fishers of Men' is a wonderful framework for how to engage men and plant the seed to grow future brothers.

Whether it's this week, this year, or this decade, planting a seed in a fertile area will undoubtedly yield fruit. Use the power of evangelization to cultivate the soil allowing that seed to take root and grow.

Nebraska achieved just below 70% of last year's growth

goal. Through continued promotion of current, and new programs, of the Knights, we will continue to attract more men to the organization.

Never overlook an opportunity to share the faith and brotherhood of the Knights of Columbus with the men of your community. Utilize e-membership often, fill the pool of potential brothers and then advance them with Charity Unity & Fraternity exemplification degrees held regularly.

As this publication enters the hands of our brother Knights, we will be ending the 1st quarter of the fraternal year. Council's and the State will be assessing how well recruiting momentum has sustained. Did we start fast and not take the summer off?

On July 12-13, 2025, Council and District Leaders from across the state gathered at the annual Leadership Training Seminar to learn and share ideas with other leaders. Many of the Councils across Nebraska were represented at this meeting filled with information and comradery. Those in attendance not only got to spend time talking with old acquaintances but also meeting new friends and learning along with them.

During the training, the State Leadership set out the new goals and plans for the upcoming fraternal year. Councils were provided with informational packets including the new State Program Book and State Growth Book, as well as resources to aid Council leaders in running effective programs and recruitment events.

Our Supreme Guest, Sterling Roach, talked about the importance of growth, strong programs, and making all our Councils compliant with Safe Environment Training. A large emphasis was placed on the requirements for getting Council Leaders enrolled and certified with the Office of Youth Protection.

The new Keystone Projects were announced and discussed, focusing on different areas of programs in the Knights of Columbus. Councils were provided with resources for

running these programs as well as given information on how to effectively turn these programs and events into recruitment opportunities for their Councils. Like last year, Councils that participate in (and report) the Keystone Projects will receive a reduction in their Membership Goal for the 2025-2026 ICC Program.

Project Lori Spreads Christmas Joy in All NE Dioceses

We are excited to announce that "Project Lori" will continue under the Knights of Columbus Intellectual Disabilities Foundation of Nebraska. With the Blessing of our State Deputy, Mike and Shelly Schaeffer, we have moved this program under the Intellectual Disabilities Foundation to continue the legacy of Past State Deputy Matt and Connie Richardson, as well as Connie's parents, Paul and Jan Hostert. Matt and Connie will be special advisors of Project Lori again this year, and we are thankful for all of their insight and passion.

A little history first. Each year around this time, Paul and Jan Hostert would start the Region 4 Christmas program. Lori, their daughter and Connie's sister, had special needs and attended Region 4 Services where she lived in a group home in O'Neill. The first year she was there the Hostert's bought every resident a jar of candy decorated as Santa. The staff told the family how much the residents loved the gift and how many residents did not receive any Christmas gifts because they had no family.

This moved the family, and the next year Jan requested a Christmas Wishlist from each resident. With no idea how the family would pay for such an extensive list, they prayed it would work out.



The lists they received taught the true meaning of Christmas. The wants were simple, but heartfelt – soap, Kleenex, a book, socks, maybe a shirt.

The extended Hostert family, the local Knights Council, friends, neighbors and soon people from other Nebraska communities heard about the effort and wanted to get involved. The blessed donations and gifts poured in – such that the family would spend hours of the night wrapping, sorting, and labeling presents. The excitement of watching residents open gifts taught everyone the true meaning of giving, and the Hosterts continued this amazing work for many years.

We have seen much of the same over the last two years of Project Lori – the smiles lighting up faces as the individuals

receive their gifts, the same simple requests, but things that mean so much.

Building upon the success of Project Lori's past four years and after speaking with many of the individuals this project has served, as well as with your help, we are looking to continue its expansion again this

year. We will again partner with organizations in each of the three Nebraska dioceses. The requests of these individuals and organizations are simple but very needed. 


Join Our 2025 Coats for Kids Drive!

Reporting is not about earning awards and being recognized. Rather, it is about sharing the wonderful things that you are doing, and inspiring other Councils to make a difference in their parishes and communities, too.

Sure, the State Family loves to recognize Councils that do great things - but we don't encourage the reporting just so we can give you an award. We legitimately want to know what great things you are doing.

We want to then share those great programs so that other Councils around the state can follow your example. And, possibly, even have your program shared by Supreme so that it is shared all around the country and can make a difference all around the world.

So, remember to take the final 5-10 minutes of your Council's next event or project to fill out the reports. Your brother Knights around the state are waiting to hear what great things you are accomplishing.

Once the money and report are received, the Foundation will write a check(s) back to the organization(s) each Council identifies on their report for up to 50% of the collected funds.

The remaining 50% is used by the Foundation to provide support for special requests from Nebraska organizations. Any funds not requested by a Council by June 30, 2026, will be forfeited by the Council, becoming Foundations funds.

We are counting on each of you to make the 2025 Campaign

for People with Intellectual Disabilities a success.

The Knights of Columbus "Keep Christ in Christmas" Poster Contest promotes the true spirit of Christmas in homes, schools, parishes, and communities. Please be sure to use the newest entry form with five age/grade categories that was introduced a few years ago.

We have made the "Keep Christ in Christmas Poster Contest" a Keystone project for 2025 - 2026. The big news for this year is that we have realigned the poster contest with international guidelines. This will allow our students to create poster masterpieces during the Christmas Season rather than the Thanksgiving Season.

Grade divisions are Kindergarten, grades 1-2, grades 3-4, grades 5-6, and grades 7-8. First and second place winners are awarded for each category.

Your Council poster contest should be rolled out to your parish youth during the first week of December. Councils should collect the posters during the week before Christmas.

Posters judging starts with the local Council's Officers as soon as feasible after collection. The 1st and 2nd place posters from each category are chosen and submitted to your District Deputy.

The DDs will announce district judging, place and time. A representative from each Council (preferably the Grand Knight or Deputy Grand Knight) within the district should join the DD to identify the top two posters in each category from all received in that district. These district winners advance to your respective Regional Growth Director by January 10th.

With the help of their respective DDs, the Regional Growth Directors will select the top two entries from each category for their region. These need to be submitted to the State Youth Chairman by January 31st.

With the help of the Regional Growth Directors, the State Youth Chairman will advance the top posters from each category for international consideration. This will be done at a scheduled Regional Meeting held in February 2026.

Winning Posters must be submitted to Supreme by the State Youth Chairman by February 28th to be considered for an International Award.

2025 Youth Soccer Challenge



State Knights of Columbus Soccer Challenge Saturday, October 25, 2025, at the Schuyler Field House

The Field House is an indoor facility connected to Schuyler Middle School. The address is 200 W. 10th St., Schuyler, NE 68661. Registration begins at 12:30 p.m. with shooting at 1:00 p.m. As a state, Nebraska offers this program to boys and girls ages 9 to 14 (based on their age on September 1st). This competition is open to all youth, no matter if they attend a Catholic school or not.

The contest will be divided into four levels of competition: Council, District, Regional, and State. State winners will be forwarded on to the Supreme office for consideration at the international level. In 2023 and 2024, Nebraska has had an international winner. The Youth Chairman is responsible for regional competition medals and state competition trophies. The Youth Chairman does not set district competition or regional dates. Those dates are set by Grand Knights and District Deputies.

Council competitions should be held between now and September 15th, with Districts taking place by the end of September.

Regional competitions should be scheduled for early October. All the information that you need to run your Council competition can be found in the Knights of Columbus Soccer Challenge Kit. Kit and program guide sheets can be ordered at Officers Online. This kit can be ordered by your Grand Knight, Deputy Grand Knight, Council Youth Director, or your Council Knights of Columbus Soccer Challenge Chairman, and will be provided to your Council free of charge.

If your Council wants to hold a competition, call Gary Groteluschen, State Youth Chairman, at 402-750-8747, and if at all possible, I will bring the equipment to your competition. All you have to have available is a soccer goal. Last year we even made a goal out of baseball backstop.

State Free Throw Contest

The Youth Free Throw contest is held after the first of the year with local contests. Generally, these are scheduled for January and February, with a Regional Competition, if necessary, in March 2026.

The State Competition is scheduled for Sat., April 11, 2026, at Grand Island Central Catholic schools in Grand Island.

Were You Aware Fraternal Benefits Recently Increased?

Member/Spouse Accidental Death Benefit

The Knights of Columbus will pay a benefit upon the death of a member or his spouse, occurring within 90 days, as the result of injury sustained in a covered accident. Protection is on a 24-hour basis for accidents that may occur anywhere in the world during activities on or off the job, on business, pleasure, vacation, or at home, except for the exclusions. This benefit is given at no cost to all members (and their wives) residing in countries that have been designated as insurance territories by the Supreme Council.

The spouse benefit at all times corresponds to the member's benefit. Should the member predecease his wife, she shall continue to be covered thereafter at a fixed benefit of \$1,500. Should the spouse and the member die within 90 days from the same accident, however, the scheduled benefit will be paid.

Beneficiaries

The accidental death benefit will be paid to the next of kin in accordance with Section 71.2 of the Order's laws. The claim for this accidental death benefit must be received at the Supreme Office of the Knights of Columbus within three years of the date of death.

Exclusions

This accidental death benefit will not be paid if death results from: suicide, self-inflicted injury while sane or insane; sickness or disease (except bacterial infection resulting from accidental cut or wound); flying, except as a fare-paying passenger on a regularly scheduled airline; or injury from driving or riding in a speed or organized contest.


